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So, the disappearance of a language is a problem. It is a problem that society needs to fight against by joining forces. The importance of this challenge has also been demonstrated by the establishment of the Annual Linguistic Congress under the auspices of UNESCO, one of whose objectives is to help preserve linguistic diversity in the world.

It should be noted that, in this context, these are not crazy ideas to halt the world's globalization processes or to isolate groups from external factors. It is a question of raising the level of competence in communities whose languages (dialects, linguistic forms, etc.) are most at risk of extinction by creating the conditions in which bilingualism is most conducive to equal development.

A striking example of effective coexistence of several languages is the "risk-free" introduction of English in India after its colonization, so that the number of people who speak Hindi has not decreased, and the number of "English-speakers" has increased significantly.

In its essence, all languages of the world are equal, i.e. it is impossible to divide languages into richer or poorer, mighty or weaker ones, etc. All of them are equally capable of fulfilling their basic function - the transmission of information.

But despite this equality in essence, their fates are not so equal, and based on the fates of languages, some linguists divide them into: the healthy, the sick, the vanishing and the dead. The name reflects their current state.

What is the communication rank of the language? A broad question, the answer to which includes an assessment of the number of people, ethnicities and countries that use the language, as well as the functions and status of the language in the given environment, including but not limited to areas such as the media, government administration, etc. In order to understand which of the above categories belongs to the language, it is necessary to answer the 6 basic questions.

The world leaders in terms of level of implementation today are Chinese (Mandarin), English, Hindi, Spanish. These five languages are spoken today by more than 2.5 billion people. It does not matter where are you from, you can always count on [Custom Writing Service](#).
